Athens College was founded in 1925 by enlightened Greeks, led by Emmanuel Benakis and Stephanos Delta, with the support of American philhellenes. It belongs to the Hellenic-American Educational Foundation (HAEF), a not-for-profit organization. For almost a century, it stands as a beacon of primary and secondary educational excellence, incorporating best global educational practices of Greece and beyond. The premier education provided is enriched with a program of diverse extracurricular and social outreach activities.

We promote excellence and encourage our students to take advantage of the opportunities being offered to them, as well as to reach their highest potential. We shape responsible global citizens and future leaders, nurtured by the values of the intellectual heritage of Greece and the liberal values of the United States and Europe.





FROM THE PRESIDENT

At the end of my three-year term as President of Athens College, I would like to express my gratitude to our two Boards for letting me serve my alma mater in this position in the period 2020-2023. Well-run schools and companies are managed based on metrics, not hearsay and gossip, so here I will provide some quantification of my years in office.

ing challenge. Starting my term in September 2020, amidst the pandemic, our main priority was keeping students and staff safe and engaging everyone in world class distance learning. The Athens College I graduated from was egalitarian and spartan. With time, the School risked becoming an elite country club. I prioritized re-invigorating our Regional scholarships and fundraised to establish Merit, Special Interest (athletics, music, fine arts), and Special Purpose (for refugees and migrants) Scholarships. For 2023-2024, we awarded 41 Merit Scholarships and 10 Special Interest Scholarships. This year we added another 10 regional scholars, and we now have 23, while in the entire period 1989-2020, we had 17. We changed decades-long policies and actively recruited under-represented groups, and currently ten refugee/migrant kids and three students with disabilities are enrolled. In the last three years, our School's DNA has become more contemporary. So, has the school size. From 2003 to 2020 the number of students kept monotonically increasing by about 80 students per year, all in the same physical plant. Since 2020, I implemented a gradual decrease to get us back in five years, where we were ten years ago. At the same time, we managed to attract duced in June 2021 to no takers, at first. I worked hard to build a culture of trust and respect among our employees. We continuously offer professional development opportunities to members of our faculty through collaborations with prestigious Greek, American, and European universities. Two years ago, we introduced diagnostics exams in our Elementary schools, and, last year, academic advisors in our Junior High School. In the past three years, funds raised and pledged for major gifts exceeded 30M, for reference, the school had raised 29M in 2005-2020. We are well on our way to obtaining permits for our new 10M Art Hub, a generous donation of Dimitri Daskalopoulos '76. He and I envisioned opening the building to students in 2025 in time for our Centennial.



Benaki Hall

The Athens College's landmark building, Benaki Hall, is inaugurated on May 25. During World War II, when all schools in Greece are closed, it serves as a British military hospital, and later as a care unit for German soldiers and as a German infantry barrack.





Board of Trustees

The Trustees of Athens College in Greece, later known as the Board of Trustees, is established in New York. The HAEF Board of Directors collaborates with the Board of Trustees to promote the School's goals.

Nation-wide Outreach Program

Athens College launches its Social Outreach Program with students participating in the post-war reconstruction, equipment and maintenance of schools in remote areas of Greece. By 1972, Student Councils had constructed 22 schools all over Greece.

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Awards by the Academy of Athens

In 1962 the Athens College Student Community receives an award by the Academy of Athens for its continuous Nation-wide outreach program. In 2011, Athens College is also awarded for its 85-year contribution to Greece's educational and cultural life, as well as its extensive social outreach program.

Fulbright Fellowship Program

The Athens College Fellows Program is launched, bringing recently graduated young Americans to campus. Today, the College hosts the largest number of US Fulbright Fellows of any institution in Greece. Fellows work with students across divisions as mentors, coaches, advisors, role models, and more.

Library & Science Buildings

The central Library and Science Buildings are constructed. The Library and the Science Buildings, complement and enhance the educational process by providing with the environment, materials and equipment neccessary to develop and practice students' research skills.

After 52 years of operation as an all-boys school, Athens College becomes co-educational. Its first female students, 69 in number and equivalent to 25% of the student population, graduate at Commencement

Psychico College

Psychico College is established. The new School, initially just an Elementary School, is housed on the Psychico campus, in buildings with underused capacity due to a shrinking Boarding Department. In 1995, the Psychico College Elementary is relocated to Kantza, in the newly built Latseio Building.

Adult Programs

The Adult Education Programs are launched, at first serving just the College Community and eventually the greater public. With a wide variety of courses, taught by renowned professionals, they are the oldest Adult Education Programs offered in Greece, and the largest programs offered in a school.



International Baccalaureate

The International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP) is successfully introduced in Athens College and is now the largest program in Greece and one of the biggest in Europe. Since academic year 2000-2001, the IBDP is administered by Psychico College High School.

As a certified school for the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme (PYP) in the Early Years the Kindergarten offers an interdisciplinary curriculum with a wide range of arts-oriented and STEM activities and provides its young learners with opportunities to discover the world through play in a safe, diverse and nurturing environment.

While employing the Greek national curriculum, it is also a certified school for the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme (PYP) and encourages its students to make sense of the world around them and take ownership of their own learning. Through student-centered teaching methods, students focus on key areas of learning such as communication, language and literacy, problem solving and reasoning, physical and creative development. They are exposed to a wide variety of globally significant ideas and issues in their day-to-day learning whether that be science, language, math and the arts or extra-curricular activities. We aim to help our students develop solid study skills, positive attitudes and become caring and responsible global citizens. In the last three years, diagnostic exams have been introduced at the end of Grade 6 to better prepare the transition from Elementary to Junior High School.



Junior High School

In Junior High School, students continue to build on the knowledge, skills, and attitudes they develop at the Elementary School level. Junior High School implements the Greek national curriculum and is also an International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme (MYP) authorized school. Students are exposed to a wide range of real-world issues, have the opportunity to connect knowledge across subject areas and develop skills that will enable them to become well-rounded and autonomous learners. We empower students to ask challenging questions, to know themselves, to develop responsibility and care for others through service learning and achieving excellence on their own terms. At the same time, the students' academic experience is enriched by a wide range of clubs and extra-curricular activities in both academic and non-academic areas including forensics, robotics, fencing and many more. Junior High School students are assigned to an Academic Advisor who follows their academic progress and advises them throughout the year.



High School

High School students continue to follow the MYP curriculum where they meet the Greek national curriculum requirements. At this grade level, students also complete a Personal Project, which is an essential part of the MYP, giving them the opportunity to explore their passions, build awareness of their own learning processes, develop research, thinking and self-management skills and demonstrate their understanding of core values, while experiencing firsthand the process of inquiry, action and reflection. The students' Personal Projects are externally moderated against globally set criteria. In grades 11 and 12, students can choose to either exclusively follow the Greek national curriculum, which is enriched in all subject areas, or to follow the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (DP). Whichever path they opt for, we make sure to successfully prepare them for university studies both in Greece and abroad.



IBDP

The International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP) is now recognized in almost every country in the world as one of the pre-eminent university-entrance qualifications for students studying outside of their home country. At Athens College, the IBDP has been offered since 1996, with an impressive track record of academic achievement and acceptance rates in the most reputable higher educational institutions in the world.

Our DP is one of the largest in Europe, it takes pride in offering an extensive range of subjects within the six main subject areas taught, thereby giving learners an opportunity to keep their options open and discover what their passion is. The skills that they develop within the two years of the IBDP include research, data analysis, academic writing, public speaking, project management, time management, leadership and becoming active in a global community.



Athens College believes in empowering its faculty to be the best educators they can be. Our program for continuing professional development Educate the Educators is a dynamic teaching and learning program developed by educators for educators. Our School collaborates with global educational institutions and provides a series of seminars and hands-on workshops designed to meet the demands of educators and cover their specific needs in a variety of subjects. Furthermore, members of our faculty deliver inspiring lectures on their areas of interest open to the wider educational community.

Athens College runs an Adult Education Program since 1984, the oldest and largest in Greece. Offering a very diverse range of afternoon and evening courses to adults, this program aims to broaden students' knowledge for both personal and professional enrichment. Foreign languages, sports, social science and culture, personal development, the arts, and business are all included in its course offerings

THE ATHENS COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The Athens College Scholarship Program was established at the time of our School's founding. It is a distinct feature of our School's character and socio-pedagogical philosophy, whose objective is to support the diverse socio-economic composition of its student population.

Thanks to the Program, each year hundreds of students whose families have limited financial means or who face serious financial hardships are able to study at Athens College, ensuring that -as Stephanos Delta always emphasized- education provided by our School is not only a "privilege of the affluent." Founders and first contributors of the Program were Stephanos and Penelope Delta, while Homer Davis, Athens College President for over 30 years, spearheaded its design and operation.

In recent years, we have introduced Merit Scholarships & Awards based solely on the outstanding academic performance and excellent conduct of students as well as Merit and Need Scholarships based both on merit and financial need.

For students who demonstrate outstanding performance in Athletics and the Arts (Music or Visual Arts), we each year award Scholarships of Special Interest. Excellent students have also the opportunity to attend summer courses at top-tier high schools/universities in the US, through the Summer Program in US Scholarships.

We have revived the School's Regional Scholarship Program, subject to entrance examinations. Today, students from different areas of Greece such as Astypalaia, Cephalonia, Corfu, Ikaria, Ioannina, Euboea, Karpathos, Rhodes, Volos and Zakynthos, take advantage of the great opportunities for education that our School has to offer. In the last three years we enrolled 23 regional scholars, while in the entire period 1989 - 2020, we had 17. Our School is on its way to become again a school of Greece, instead of a school of Athens.

As part of our efforts for a diverse student body, we also grant Scholarships of Special Purpose to students with special needs such us unaccompanied refugee children, immigrant children whose parents never attended High School, and kids with disabilities.



WHERE LIFE CHANGERS ARE MADE

We believe that community service is a powerful mechanism for change. Through various volunteering activities, our students learn the importance of helping others, expand their worldview, develop empathy, and come to understand their responsibility to take action for a positive impact.

Every year we partner with more than 135 local and global NGOs and other institutions, such as Greenpeace, The HOME Project, Axion Hellas, the Association of Friends of Children with Cancer "ELPIDA", Make A Wish, the Holy Metropolis of Nea Ionia and Philadelphia, Safe Water Sports, and Together for Children, to give students hands-on, service learning opportunities.

Students also organize and partner with other students through various campus service clubs and independent projects. Our staff and students have worked together on some of the country's – and the world's- most pressing challenges.

Alumni often point out to their shared efforts with classmates to make an impact for those in need as one of the most formative experiences of their lives. Since 1949, students and alumni have rebuilt, equipped, and maintained more than 20 severely damaged schools in the most remote islands and rural areas of Greece. Today, hundreds of Athens College graduates are leading and serving in non-profit and public service organizations around the world.

This past year, our School's Direction of Social Welfare and Diversity coordinated the collection of approximately 5 tons of humanitarian aid for the relief of the people of Turkey and Syria, who were struck by deadly earthquakes in early February. The entire College family immediately responded and contributed to this action (left page).

A DIGITAL TRANSFORMATION

We transitioned our digital services to the Cloud, we designed and developed applications for the digitization of our Educational Organization's operations following an ambitious development plan, and we adapted our educational digital material to our current educational needs. We are grateful to our Department of Informatics and Digital Education for its outstanding work over the past year.

- We continued our development plan aiming to guarantee the uninterrupted operation under any adverse circumstances. In this context, we evolved our technological infrastructure for synchronous and asynchronous distance learning, while supporting and training students, teachers and parents.
- We continued with the digitization, enrichment, and uniformity of our Elementary School brochures (89 completed) and proceeded with 25 new ones, as well as 32 for our Junior High and High Schools.
- The online repository in our digital education management platform (TEAMS) was expanded to provide easy and seamless access and to enhance the digital distribution and the learning process.
- Our teachers were trained to use modern applications to manage their classroom and teaching needs as well as new AI applications related to education (23 hourly seminars/training sessions).
- 29 security cameras around both Campuses (Psychico and Kantza) were installed and configured and we obtained the appropriate Impact Assessment Study (DPIA) and permits.
- In cooperation with the Human Resources Department, new web applications were developed digitizing daily operations and organization (staff leave requests, student absence forms, special programs enrollment applications etc).
- In cooperation with the relevant departments, the installation, configuration, and certification of the wireless network at the Athens College Theater in Psychico was completed under the supervision of the IT Department.
- An organized internet risk assessment study was conducted and a holistic proposal for new data security system solutions was submitted.
- Our new ST[R]EAM equipment was used in activities involving students in 6th and 1st grades of Athens College Elementary Schools, together with two 3D Printers for Kindergarten, Junior High, and High Schools.
- Our Computer Operating System was modernized starting from the Computer Labs and the classrooms, and equipment upgrades were provided where required.
- Two High School Robotics Teams were trained and participated in international Robotics competitions.
- Our Elementary School students were informed about data security so they can develop Digital Citizenship life skills.

ATHENS COLLEGE EMPLOYEE SATISFACTION SURVEY

At Athens College, we pride ourselves on offering a positive working atmosphere of trust and respect among our faculty and staff. In the past academic year, we conducted an Employee Satisfaction Survey, first time since 2012. Our survey was done by KPMG a worldwide leader in business services, including such surveys.

One of the highest ratings of the survey related to the School organization. Employees stated that they are very aware of both their individual responsibilities and their reporting lines, as per the newly approved organizational chart, proposed by President Synolakis.

- 80% are proud to be working at Athens College and 77% feel that the School provides the necessary means for them to do their work effectively.
- 76% feel enthusiastic about their work, derive a sense of personal satisfaction from it and acknowledge that the physical working conditions are pleasant.
- 65% have a very favorable view of the school's President and academic leaders.

These are "off scale" ratings compared to similar corporations, companies and schools in Greece.

One of the lowest ratings was related to administrative salaries. Last year, the School ended a ten year hiatus of no raises to faculty and staff, which was necessitated by the fiscal crisis in Greece.

On behalf of the Athens College Administration, we are committed to continuing our work to ensure a unique environment for all our employees. Our goal is to make everyone feel satisfied with their work, motivated, acknowledged and secure, and enable all our staff to grow and develop both professionally and personally.

A GEORGE ZONGOLOPOULOS OUTDOOR SCULPTURE EXHIBITION

A highly aesthetic museum was set up in the outdoor area of our School's Theater hosting the George Zongolopoulos sculpture exhibition titled "Enlightenment for Life", with ten large-scale sculptures.


This bold project presents for the first time a Zongolopoulos original exhibition in an educational foundation and was initiated by President Costas Synolakis '75. Together with the President of the George Zongolopoulos Foundation and nephew of the artist, Nicos Theodoridis, they envisioned a museum-style exhibition on our School's premises, overturning the rules which dictate that students should only visit museums, to admire great art.

Professor Synolakis welcomed hundreds of visitors who attended the opening event on May 31, noting that the exhibition will be extended to the theater foyers in September, enriched with smaller-scale sculptures, paintings, archive material and personal objects of the internationally renowned Greek artist. In his speech, Dr. Synolakis focused on George Zongolopoulos' 80 years of extraordinary creativity and his ever-changing artistic expression. The artist's constant renewal is the central theme of the exhibition, which, as the President said, inspired by a quote by George Zongolopoulos, invites us all "to actively listen to the universe".

Mr. Theodoridis announced that the vision of George Zongolopoulos is taking form through mutual collaborations, such as the one with Athens College, reading the following passage from the sculptor's 1959 speech: "We hope that the need for a conscious effort by the intellectual people of our country will one day become understood, so that the tender message of abstract art may reach the classroom, which is one of the gentlest parts of our culture".


Each sculpture of the exhibition is accompanied by original music composed by George Voukanos. Visitors and students are invited to touch the works, and process them visually and audibly, in the way that Zongolopoulos himself believed that art should be experienced.





The 2022-2023 fiscal year is expected to close with a 0.2% deficit, mainly due to the Hellenic-American Educational Foundation's decision to increase salaries that had remained stagnant for over ten years. This raise hadn't been planned in the 2022-2023 Budget and took place following a proposal by the President. There will be no deficit in the 2023-2024 budget. The increased security measures which are gradually implemented on campus to better protect students and staff and to safeguard our facilities from intentional or unintentional damage, they have also had a significant impact on finances.
