TED Talks in the Classroom

When we create a safe space for self-expression in our classrooms, our students can really explore who they are and who they want to be. As Mr. Browne, the English teacher from the novel *Wonder*, asserts "learning who you are is what you are here [at school] to do." As teachers we know bearing witness to this process is part of the magic of teaching. Helping students along their path, a privilege. This presentation will take you step by step through a project designed to give adolescent students an empowering opportunity to articulate their values and beliefs, using TED Talks as a model for self-expression and

oral communication. With the novel *Wonder* as a spring board and TED Talks as a tool, students engage in a public speaking project that articulates who they are and what they believe in.

Sara Latham holds a Master's Degree in English from the University of Texas at Arlington. She has 20 years of teaching experience at various levels ranging from university level writing and literature courses to middle and high school English courses. Since 2005, she has been teaching English in Greece, first at Anatolia College in Thessaloniki and currently at Athens College Elementary School.

Can Preschoolers Speak English?



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Teaching for Understanding and Communication Using Authentic Materials

A brief overview of current research on language acquisition will provide support for the design, implementation and outcome of a Primary Years Program, Unit of Inquiry, taught at Psychico College Elementary School using *authentic literature* in 3rd Grade EFL classrooms. Participants will be given excerpts from the Unit Plan along with samples of worksheets and activities that were used in the implementation phase of the unit plan. Additionally, samples of students' oral and written responses to the story will demonstrate the success of using authentic material to build communication skills with students in an EFL program of instruction.

Anna Ioannou has a Bachelor's Degree in Arts and Science from York University, Canada. She has been a staff member at HAEF since 1985, and has been teaching English in the primary school for the last twenty-five years. She has also taught Theatre Arts at the High School and Junior High School level, and has been trained to translate for the deaf and blind at the Canadian National Institution for the Blind (CNIB).

Helen Papamichalopoulos holds a Bachelor's of Education in TESL from McGill University, and taught English as a second language at the high school level for three years in Montreal before moving to Greece. She currently teaches English at Psychico College Elementary school.

Judy Nelson received her BA in Developmental Psychology /Elementary Education from Lawrence University in Wisconsin, and her MA from the Faculty for Exceptional Children at Ohio State University. She has been teaching at Psychico College Elementary School since 1991 where she is currently Head of English. She has been a strong proponent of differentiated learning and has been instrumental in establishing and teaching the Language Lab at Psychico College Elementary School for students with diagnosed learning difficulties.
