Innovating Our Way Out Of The Box

What is innovation? These days it tends to mean 'using technology in the classroom', but is there more to it? Can we innovate without technology? Can we motivate without turning on the PC? Can we engage students without pressing 'play'?!

In this practical and interactive presentation I will explore these subjects by looking at some of the innovations in the field of teaching which have occurred recently and which don't involve technology. I shall draw on innovations in the business world which we can apply to ELT, as well as developments in the field of neuro-psychology to examine what we have recently learnt about what goes on in kids heads when they learn and what that means for teachers.

Michael Robbs has been teaching English in Greece for over twenty years. He has a Masters in TESL/TEFL (Teaching English as a Second or Foreign Language) from Saint Michael's College, Vermont, and has coauthored seven English teaching books involving grammar, testing and composition writing. Innovation in pedagogy is currently seeking to move away from knowledge fragmentation and pave the way for a more holistic and comprehensive knowledge acquisition. Does this mean that the traditional means of teaching and learning are no longer useful? Not necessarily.
